Notice of Special Needs Scholarship Program

his notice serves to inform parents and quardians of students with disabilities that the State of Wisconsin has established the Special Needs Scholarship Program. Under this scholarship program and as further specified in state law, a child with a disability who has been denied the opportunity to attend a nonresident school district under the fulltime open enrollment program may be eligible to receive a scholarship from the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) that allows the child to attend an eligible private school that is participating in the Special Needs Scholarship Program.

This is a state-administered program. A parent or quardian who is interested in the Special Needs Scholarship Program should independently verify the participating private schools and the specific terms, eligibility criteria, and application procedures of the scholarship program with the DPI.

The Special Needs Scholarship Program is further defined under section 115.7915 of the state statutes. However, special eligibility requirements not found in that statute exist for program scholarships that are awarded for private school attendance that began in the 2016-17 school year. Parchment - Electronic Transcripts

oricon High School students or alumni who wish to have a transcript sent to a post-secondary institution should make transcript requests using www.parchment. com. Universities will now be able to view the transcript immediately instead of waiting for a paper copy to be processed and mailed. Users create an account and then are able to request an electronic transcript for a small fee (\$4.40). Students who qualify for the free/reduced price school lunch program may receive fee waivers for up to four transcripts. Students should allow up to five school days for transcript requests to be processed. Please contact the high school counselor for more information.

Online Payment Option Available

to offer a program called **e-Funds** for Schools. This program offers various options for parents/quardians who **choose** encryption. to make payments on-line and is extremely user-friendly. Not only will you have the ability to have various school fees and lunch payments electronically withdrawn from your checking account or charged to your credit card, you also have the flexibility to make a payment at any time through the school's website. The e-Funds For Schools service is offered to you by a third party service provider and they charge for processing your payment(s), similar to other on-line banking services. The district does not request or keep records of family checking or credit card account information.

The "e-Funds For Schools" service provider has a nominal fee for their service. This plan applies a \$1.50 transaction fee for each electronic payment you make. For payments made by credit card, there is an added convenience fee of \$2.95 per \$100 transaction. The system also carries a Non-Sufficient Funds (NSF) charge of \$15.00. When you set up your account, please review your options carefully.

You are in full control of your account and can make a payment at any time that is convenient for you. No payments will be allowed without your knowledge and authorization through this secure payment system. By providing your home and/or work e-mail address, an e-mail notification informing you of the student's name, purpose of the payment, and the amount of the item will be sent

The School District of Horicon is pleased to you each time that a payment is to be processed. The e-Funds For Schools site is secure and uses industry standard data

How does e-Funds For Schools work?

- Families set up and maintain their own logins, passwords, and payment preferences. Your account information is retained in a password-protected file.
- E-Funds For Schools will help to eliminate last minute check writing hassles, improve efficiencies, and help cut costs for both you and the school district.
- On-line payments will help eliminate the worry that your children could lose or forget the money intended for school items or that it might be spent on nonschool related items.
- Payments from a credit card or checking account may easily be set up.
- Parents/quardians may establish a reoccurring payment or may opt to make a one-time payment.
- The program offers various types of payment to families that include class fees and nutrition program payments. The system may be expanded to include other fees as well.
- Your payment history for the year is available with a click of the mouse.
- Enrolling in e-Funds for Schools is easy. Go to the school district website. Click on "eFunds" and create an account and have your child's student ID number. If you have any questions please contact your respective school office.

Inclement Weather - Attendance - Make-Up Days

Wisconsin winter weather conditions provide some challenging decisions regarding whether the School District of Horicon should remain open, be delayed by two hours, close early, or be completely cancelled. With student safety as the highest priority, these difficult decisions are always made with the best possible road condition and weather information available at the time from multiple sources. Please remember that it remains the decision of the parent/guardian to determine if weather conditions are safe enough for their child, or children, to attend school. Should parents or guardians decide not to send their child, or children, to school on an inclement weather day, we require that you call the appropriate building secretary, or principal, and inform him/her when your child will be in attendance at school. In this way, parents/guardians can be informed of how their student's attendance record will be documented. If parents/guardians do not call the school prior to an inclement weather day absence, students will be marked absent accordingly.

In order to keep families well informed, the School District will send information via school newsletters, the District website, and e-mail, about any school make-up days that may be required during the school year.

ATHLETIC PHYSICAL EXAMINATION

Per WIAA Senior High School Handbook, Article VII, a student may not practice for or participate in interscholastic athletics until the school has written evidence on file in its office attesting to (a) parental permission each school year and (b) current physical fitness to participate in sports as determined by a licensed physician or Advanced Practice Nurse Prescriber (APNP) no less than every other school year. A physical before April 1 will be good for that school year and the next. School policy determines when an athlete may return to competition following an injury, except where rule book or WIAA tournament policies apply.

STUDENT PARKING INFORMATION

Students who drive and park a vehicle at school must register their vehicle(s) in the High School office and receive a parking permit. Students may not park on school property without registering their vehicle(s). Student vehicles are restricted to the student parking lot during the school day. Vehicles are off limits to students during the school day unless permission is granted to access a vehicle by the Principal or Principal Designee. A student's parking permit may be suspended or revoked. Failure to comply with administrative guidelines may result in loss of privileges and/or disciplinary actions for the student.

All vehicles registered and parked upon the property of the School District of

Horicon are subject to search at any time upon request of school officials. Through completing the registration process, the student, parents of the student, and owner of the vehicle consent to a search of the vehicle at any time upon request of school officials. Any refusal to permit a search of a registered vehicle parked upon school district property will result in permanent revocation of registration and parking privileges, together with a referral to law enforcement authorities.

Most importantly, all drivers are to maintain control at a safe speed, wear seat belts, and never text and drive!

Student Attendance

compulsory school attendance. A call from home or a written excuse must be provided for every absence. If a child must be absent, parents are asked to contact the school no later than 9:00 a.m. on the day of the absence. If a parent does not contact the school in regard to an absence, an automated call will be made in order to assure that each child is accounted for on any given day.

Parents may call their child's school office at any time and leave a message regarding their child's absence. A written excuse or phone call should state the reason for the absence, date(s) of the absence, and include the name of the parent or quardian. A physician's statement may be required in the case of communicable diseases, extenuating circumstances, or after three consecutative

The state of Wisconsin requires days absent due to illness. If a phone call is not received or if a written note is not presented within two days of the child's absence, the absence will be considered unexcused. If a student has seen a doctor, dentist, or counselor, it is recommended that the parent bring a statement from the professional indicating that the child was seen by the professional.

> No student will be allowed to leave school prior to dismissal time without the parent contacting the school office to request the release. No student will be released to a person other than a custodial parent(s) or quardian without a permission note signed by the custodial parent or quardian.

> Parents and students should review the student/parent handbook to learn what is considered an excused absence.

Release of Student Photos, Information, Directory Info.

During the course of a school year, individual students and student groups are occasionally video recorded and/or photographed in classroom situations, during fine arts performances, on field trips, while participating in athletics, etc. The resulting photo and/or video may be used in a variety of ways, to promote the school: to instruct students or staff members; or to orient new parents, staff, and students. The final product could also take a variety of forms: photo displays, slide-presentations, newspaper articles, pamphlets, video programs, and the school vearbook.

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act allows any parent/guardian or eligible student the right to inform the school of their desire that their child not be photographed or video recorded.

The educational interests of students require the collection, retention, and use of information about individual students and groups of students. At the same time, a student's right of privacy under Federal and State law mandates careful custodianship and limitations on access to student records.

The School District of Horicon has designated the following information as directory information. Unless a parent

denies permission in writing, this may appear in news releases and may be released to the public under the open records law:

Parents and eligible students may refuse to allow the Board to disclose any or all of such "directory information" upon written notification to the Board within 14 days after receipt of this public notice.

OPEN ENROLLMENT INFORMATION

Wisconsin's inter-district public school open enrollment program allows parents to apply for their children to attend school districts other than the one in which they live. A student may apply to no more than three nonresident school districts. Pursuant to WI State Statute s. 118.51 (3) (a) 1d. and 118.51 (3m) (a), Stats., applications to virtual charter schools do not count toward the three nonresident school board limit.

Wisconsin residents in 5-year-old kindergarten to grade 12 may apply to participate in open enrollment. Students in pre-kindergarten may participate only in limited circumstances; parents should call their resident school district to find out if their preschool-aged children qualify.

Parents must submit application forms to the nonresident school district during the application period. - 2. D=diphtheira, T=tetanus, P=pertussis vaccine. DTP/DTaP/DT vaccine for all students **Pre-K-12**: 4 doses required. (Note: a dose 4 days or less before the 4th birthday is also acceptable).
- 3. DTP/DTaP/DT vaccine for children **enter- ing K:** Each student must have received one dose after the 4th birthday (either the 3rd, 4th, or 5th dose) to be compliant. (Note: a dose 4 days or less before the 4th birthday is also acceptable).
- 4. Tdap is adolescent tetanus, diphtheria and acellular pertussis vaccine. If a student received a dose of a tetanuscontaining vaccine, such as Td, within 5 years of entering the grade in which Tdap is required, the student is compliant and a dose of Tdap vaccine is

- not required.
- 5. Polio vaccine for students entering grades **K-12**: Four doses are required. However, if the student received the 3rd dose after the 4th birthday, further doses are not required. (Note: a dose 4 days or less before the 4th birthday is also acceptable).
- 6. Laboratory evidence of immunity to hepatitis B is also acceptable.
- MMR is measles, mumps, and rubella vaccine. The first dose must have been received on or after the first birthday (Note: a dose 4 days or less before the 1st birthday is also acceptable). Laboratory evidence of immunity to all three diseases (measles, mumps, & rubella) is also acceptable.
- 8. Varicella vaccine is chickenpox vaccine. A history of chickenpox disease/ laboratory evidence of immunity to varicella is also acceptable.

Required Immunization Before Entering Elementary School

All students must present evidence that they have received at least the first dose of each type of vaccine required for their grade level within 30 school days after admission to school. Waivers are available for health reasons (signed by a physician) and religious or personal convictions (signed by a parent).

Required Notice About Meningitis

Meningitis is a serious disease caused by bacteria. It results in inflammation of the lining of the brain and spinal cord. This disease can be fatal in a matter of hours or days. Meningitis can be misdiagnosed as something less serious because early symptoms are similar to those of common viral illnesses. Symptoms may include:

• Stiff neck, Sudden onset of high fever, and/or Headache

It is important for your child to be

vaccinated against meningitis even if they will not go to college or enter the military. This disease is spread through saliva by such activities as kissing, sharing food or drinks, or sharing lip balm or cigarettes.

Most doctors and the Dodge County Public Health offer a shot that can protect your eleven-year-old to college-aged child from most forms of the disease. Contact your doctor or the Dodge County Public Health at 920-386-3670.

School District of Horicon Bullying Policy

The Board of Education is committed to providing a safe, positive, productive, and nurturing educational environment for all of its students. The Board encourages the promotion of positive interpersonal relations between members of the school community. Bullying toward a student, whether by other students, staff, or third parties is strictly prohibited and will not be tolerated. This prohibition includes physical, verbal, and psychological abuse. The Board will not tolerate any gestures, comments, threats, or actions which cause or threaten to cause bodily harm or personal degradation. This policy applies to all activities in the District, including activities on school property, including at any of the school buildings or other property used exclusively or in part, whether leased or owned by the District, for the purpose of school-related functions or events; or while traveling to or from school or to and from school-sponsored functions or events; in transporting vehicles arranged for by School District officials. The policy applies as well during activities that occur off school property if the student or employee is at any school-sponsored, school-approved or schoolrelated activity or function, such as field trips or athletic events where students are under the supervision of school authorities, or where an employee is engaged in school business, or where there is otherwise a connection to the school such that the conduct at issue affects or is intended to affect the student's educational environment.

Any student that believes s/he has been or is the victim of bullying should immediately report the situation to the building principal or assistant principal, or the District Administrator. The student may also report concerns to a teacher or counselor who will be responsible for notifying the appropriate administrator or Board official. Complaints against the building principal should be filed with the District Administrator. Complaints against the District Administrator should be filed with the Board President.

The School District will respect the privacy of the complainant, the individual(s) against who the complaint is filed, and the witnesses as much as possible, consistent with the Board's legal obligations to investigate, to take appropriate action, and to conform with any discovery or disclosure obligations. All

records generated under this policy and its related administrative guidelines shall be maintained as confidential to the extent permitted by law.

To the extent appropriate in conducting a thorough investigation and/or as legally permitted, confidentiality will be maintained during the investigation process.

Use of Medication in School

Medication should be given at home if at all possible. When, under exceptional circumstances, a student is required to take medication at school, it must be in compliance with these guidelines.

Procedures for obtaining and filing medical information:

- 1. The parent or quardian must provide written consent for a member of the school staff to dispense medication via 4. All "over the counter" medication (such "Parent/Guardian Medication Consent" form. This form can be obtained from the school offices or at www.horicon. k12.wi.us.
- 2. Prescription medications will only be administered under the direction of a physician. This is done by the physician "Parent/Guardian Medication Consent With Physician's Order For Medication" form. This form is available at the school office or the School District Per State Statute 118,29(5), no employee the form by the physician.
- 3. Medication must be received in the

original container from the pharmacy. It must be labeled with the following:

- a. Name of student
- b. Name of medication
- c. Dosage of the medication
- d. Time the medication is to be dispensed

Alcohol-Drugs-Tobacco

Ise of alcohol, controlled substances, tobacco, CBD, all derivatives of hemp. including Delta-8-THC, Delta-9-THC, Delta-10-THC, Delta-11-THC, THC-0, all other forms that cause psychosis, all chemicals which release toxic vapors, in the school building, on school grounds, prior to or at any school activity, local or away is forbidden. Additionally, possession of any of these items, or drug paraphernalia, in the school building, or school grounds, or at any school activity, local or away, is forbidden. Any student using or possessing the above faces legal and school disciplinary action of suspension and possible recommendation for expulsion. School officials will use reasonable and constitutionally permissible means to assure that the property and schools of the district shall be made free of alcohol, drugs, and other controlled substances. This may include searching students and their possessions.

If time is not available to translate in written form, a phone call is made to share the information verbally. Community service announcements are also conveyed to the parents in either written/verbal form. A translator is available at parent education meetings and parent teacher conferences.

Military Recruiter Access to Students/Records

istricts receiving federal education funds are required to notify parents of secondary school students that:

- 1. A secondary school student, or the parent of the student, may request that the student's name, address, school email address, and telephone listing not be released to military recruiters or institutions of higher education without prior written parental consent: and

School District of Horicon Nutrition Programs

The School District of Horicon supports an environment of healthy nutrition for all students. By offering healthy choices that are nutritious and appealing, we are giving our students the building blocks for learning. Research shows that students who participate in the school meal programs consume more milk, fruits, and vegetables during meal times and have better intake of certain nutrients, such as calcium and fiber, than nonparticipants. And, eating breakfast at school is associated with better attendance rates, fewer missed school days, and better test scores. Meals served through these programs must meet specific nutrition requirements.

There are five required meal pattern components in the National School Lunch Program (NSLP): Meat/Meat Alternate (M/ MA), Grain, Milk, Fruit, and Vegetable. There are three required meal pattern components in the School Breakfast Program (SBP): Grain, Fruit (or Vegetable, and Milk. These must be offered by schools during each lunch meal and each breakfast meal, respectively.

MENU

All menus will follow the USDA guidelines along with the Department of Instruction meal requirements. Horicon will go above the nutrition guidelines by offering a fresh fruit and vegetable bar daily along with whole grains and low fat entrée options. The fresh fruit and vegetable bar will be promoted as "Take what you would like, but eat what you take." All students will have access to 2-3 fruits and 5-8 fresh vegetables daily. We will use scratch cooking and whole foods as often as possible. We will also be working with our FFA program to purchase fresh produce from our new areen house.

Menus will be created monthly and posted in the cafeteria and on the school website. Menus will be sent home with elementary students and are also available at:

FREE OR REDUCED MEALS

Free or reduced meal applications are available on line or at the school office. We encourage anyone who thinks they may qualify to apply. You may apply anytime throughout the year. There is no

BREAKFAST

K-5th:

Breakfast will be available from 7:30 until the start of school. Breakfast will include a choice of milk, two fruits and main entrée. 6-12th:

Students will also participate in a nutrition break (9:27 to 9:37) during which they can purchase a breakfast meal or ala carte items.

Students wishing to purchase ala carte must have money in their account.

ALA CARTE

Ala carte items or "extras" are offered at each meal to 6th-12th grade students. The best practice is to communicate your expectations of ala carte purchases with your child. Students are able to check their balance on their PowerSchool account. Items available for ala carte purchase must adhere to the smart snack guidelines of less than 200 calories, 200 mg sodium, less than 10% fat and no trans fats. No student may purchase ala carte with a negative balance.

LUNCH

K-5th:

Students will have access to 3 options daily, 2 main entrées and a turkey sandwich choice. Each meal will have access to the fresh fruit and vegetable bar.

6th-8th:

Students will have access to 2 daily choices and ala carte options. Ala carte may be purchased by your middle school student if they have money in their account. You may put a block on ala carte purchases by contacting Kim Waech, Food Service Director at kwaech@horicon.k12.wi.us. Students will be reminded when the balance in their account falls below \$10.00. The District allows a charge of meals up to a negative balance of \$10. No student may purchase ala carte with a negative balance. Parents are responsible for any and all ala carte and meal purchases (see Horicon Charged Meal/Delinguent Balance Procedure in the

student/parent handbook.)

9th-12th

Students will have access to 2 daily choices as well as ala carte options. High school has access to ala carte purchases if they have a positive fund balance. hildren need healthy meals to learn. to pay in a timely fashion. The School District of Horicon offers healthy meals every school day. Please refer to page 6 of this calendar for a complete listing of meal costs. Your children may qualify for free meals or for reduced price meals; or free milk. To access the free and reduced lunch application form, go to www.horicon.k12. wi.us, then "Food Service" menu, or call any school office.

- 1. Do I need to fill out an application for each child? No. Complete the application to apply for free or reduced price meals. Use one Free and Reduced Price School Meals Application for all students in the household. We cannot approve an application that is not complete, so be sure to fill out all required information. Return the completed application to: Kim Waech, Food Service Director, School District of Horicon.
- 2. Who can get free meals? Children in households getting FoodShare or W-2 cash benefits and most foster children can get free meals regardless of family income. Also, children can get free priced meals if the household income is within the free limits on the Federal Income Guidelines.
- 3. Who is responsible for accrued dollar amounts in my child(ren's) lunch account before my application is approved? Parents are responsible for all accrued lunch account dollars before application is processed and are required

- 4. Can homeless, runaway and migrant children get free meals? Please call the school to see if your child(ren) qualify, if you have not been informed that they will get free meals.
- 5. Who can get reduced price meals? Children can get low cost meals if the household income is within the reduced price limits on the Federal Income
- 6. Should I fill out an application if I got a letter this school year saying my children are approved for free or reduced price meals? Please read the letter you received carefully and follow the instructions. Call the school at 920-**485-2898** if you have guestions.
- 7. I get WIC. Can my child(ren) get free meals? Children in households participating in WIC may be eligible for free or reduced price meals. Please fill out an application.
- 8. Will the information I give be checked? Yes, we may ask you to send written proof.
- 9. If I don't qualify now, may I apply later? Yes. You may apply at any time during the school year if the household size goes up, income goes down, or if you start getting FoodShare, W-2 cash benefits or other benefits. If you lose your job, your children may be able to get free or reduced price meals.
- 10. What if I disagree with the school's decision about my application? You should talk to your

child's school principal. You also may ask for a hearing by calling or writing to: Richard Appel, 841 Gray St., Horicon, WI 53032, (920-485-2898).

- 11. May I apply if someone in my household is not a U.S. citizen? Yes. You or your child(ren) do not have to be a U.S. citizen to qualify for free or reduced price meals.
- 12. Who should I include as members of my household? You must include all people living in your household, related or not (such as grandparents, other relatives, or friends). You must include yourself and all children who live with you.
- 13. What if my income is not always the same? List the amount that you normally get. For example, if you normally get \$1000 each month, but you missed some work last month and only got \$900, put down that you get \$1000 per month. If you normally get overtime, include it, but not if you get it sometimes.
- 14. We are in the military, do we include our housing allowance as **income?** If your housing is part of the Military Housing Privatization Initiative, do not include vour housing allowance as income. All other allowances must be included in your gross income.

- Stav seated at all times.
- Sit facing the front of the bus.
- Keep your voice at a low level so that vou are not a distraction to the driver or other riders.
- Show respect for other students at all
- Obey the bus driver at all times this will decrease driving distractions.
- ES students must ride in the front of the bus, MS students must ride in the middle of the bus, HS students ride in the back of the bus.

Studies have shown that the majority of bus-related injuries to children occur outside of the bus. Please emphasize the importance of having your child wait for the bus driver's hand signal to cross the road to protect him/her from motorists passing illegally.

Bussing and Transportation Notice

ccording to Section 121.54(2), Awisconsin Statutes, a pupil attending a public elementary or secondary school, including kindergarten, is entitled to transportation by the public school district in which the pupil resides if the pupil resides two or more miles from the nearest public school the pupil is entitled to attend. In addition, Section 121.54(9). Wis. Stats., provides that districts are required to transport pupils who reside in the same city as the school they attend when unusual hazards exist for pupils in walking to and from the school where

they are enrolled.

The School District of Horicon provides bus transportation for students meeting the state defined criteria for distance, city residence and unusually hazardous transportation areas. The bus schedule and route information is available by contacting Johnson Bus Services at 920-485-2223 after August 24.

Students will ride only assigned school buses and will board and depart from the bus at assigned bus stops. Students will not be permitted to ride unassigned buses for any reason other than an emergency

or prearranged change approved by their principal.

A change in a student's regular assigned bus stop may be granted for a special need, if a note from a parent is submitted to the building principal stating the reason for the request, the duration of the change, and the principal's approval.

DPI Quality Teacher Info.

- 3. What was the major of my child's teacher in college?
- 4. What degree does my child's teacher hold?
- 5. Are there instructional aides working with my child? If so, what are their qualifications? (Answers to questions #1 to #5 can be obtained by contacting Mrs. Katie Schwartz, Director of Special Education and Student Learning, at 920-485-2898).

SCHOOL DISTRICT OF HORICON CONFIDENTIALITY OF PERSONALLY IDENTIFIABLE INFORMATION OBTAINED THROUGH CHILD FIND ACTIVITIES

The School District of Horicon is required to locate, identify, and evaluate each child with a disability including children with disabilities attending private schools in the school district as well as identify homeless children. The process of locating, identifying, and evaluating children with disabilities is known as child find. Any community member with concerns about a child's development can participate in child find by contacting the School District. The School District of Horicon collects information from each child's family regarding the level of the child's development. Specifically, details regarding the child's social, emotional, behavioral, and academic development from the eyes of the family members who spend the majority of time with the student is solicited. The information provided by parents is used to determine whether a child should be further evaluated for a suspected disability. This notice informs parents of the records the school district will develop and maintain as part of its child find activities and it informs parents of their rights regarding any records developed.

The school district gathers personally identifiable information on any child who participates in child find activities. Parents, teachers, and other professionals provide information to the school related to the child's academic performance, behavior, and health. This information is used to determine whether the child needs special education services. Personally identifiable information directly related to a child and maintained by the school is a pupil record. Pupil records include records maintained in any way including, but not limited to, computer storage media, video and audiotape, film, microfilm, and microfiche. Records maintained for personal use by a teacher and not available to others and records available only to persons involved in the psychological treatment of a child are not pupil records.

The school district maintains several classes of pupil records.

• "Progress records" include grades, courses the child has taken, the child's attendance record, immunization records, required lead screening records, and records of school extra-curricular activities. Progress records must be maintained for at least five

years after the child ceases to be enrolled.

- "Behavioral records" include such records as psychological tests, personality evaluations, records of conversations, written statements relating specifically to the pupil's behavior, tests relating specifically to achievement or measurement of ability, physical health records other than immunization and lead screening records, law enforcement officers' records, and other pupil records that are not "progress records." Law enforcement officers' records are maintained separately from other pupil records. Behavioral records may be maintained for no longer than one year after the child graduates or otherwise ceases to be enrolled, unless the parent specifies in writing that the records may be maintained for a longer period of time. The school district informs parents when pupil records are no longer needed to provide special education. At the request of the child's parents, the school district destroys the information that is no longer needed.
- "Directory data" includes the student's name, date of birth, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, photographs, degrees and awards received.
- "Pupil physical health records" include basic health information about a pupil, including the pupil's immunization records, an emergency medical card, a log of first aid and medicine administered to the pupil, an athletic permit card, a record concerning the pupil's ability to participate in an education program, any required lead screening records, the results of any routine screening test, such as for hearing, vision or scoliosis, and any followup to the test, and any other basic health information, as determined by the state superintendent. Any pupil record relating to a pupil's physical health that is not a pupil physical health record is treated as a patient health care record under sections 146.81 to 146.84, Wisconsin Statutes. Any pupil record concerning HIV testing is treated as provided under section 252.15, Wisconsin Statutes.

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), the Individuals

- with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), and section 118.125, Wisconsin Statutes, afford parents and students over 18 years of age ("eligible students") the following rights with respect to education records:
- The right to inspect and review the student's education records within 45 days of receipt of the request. Parents or eligible students should submit to the school principal a written request that identifies the records(s) they wish to inspect. The principal will make arrangements for access and notify the parent or eligible student of the time and place where the records may be inspected. The school district will comply with the request without unnecessary delay and before any meeting about an individualized education program, or any due process hearing, and in no case more than 45 days after the request has been made. If any record includes information on more than one child, the parents of those children have the right to inspect and review only the information about their child or to be informed of that specific information. Upon request, the school district will give a parent or eligible student a copy of the progress records and a copy of the behavioral records. Upon request, the school district will give the parent or eligible student a list of the types and locations of education records collected, maintained, or used by the district for special education. The school district will respond to reasonable requests for explanations and interpretations of the records. A representative of the parent may inspect and review the records.
- The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the parent or eligible student believes is inaccurate or misleading. Parents or eligible students may ask the School District of Horicon to amend a record that they believe is inaccurate or misleading. They should write the school principal, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it is inaccurate or misleading. If the district decides not to amend the record, the district will notify the parent or eligible student of the decision and the right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be

provided to the parent or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.

- The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information in the student's education records, except to the extent that federal and state law authorize disclosure without consent. The exceptions are stated in 34 CFR 99.31, Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act regulations; Sec. 9528, PL107-110, No Child Left Behind Act of 2001; and section 118.125(2)(a) to (m) and sub. (2m), Wisconsin Statutes. One exception that permits disclosure without consent is disclosures to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the district as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, or support staff member (including health or medical staff and law enforcement unit personnel); a person serving on the school board: a person or company with whom the district has contracted to perform a special task (such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist); or a parent or student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks. A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility. Upon request, the district discloses education records without consent to officials of another school district in which a student seeks or intends to enroll. Also the district discloses "directory data" without consent, unless the parent notifies the district that it may not be released without prior parental consent.
- The right to file a complaint with the U. S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the District to comply with the requirements of FERPA. Use of Cell Phones or Electronic Communication Devices

Middle and High School students may use Personal Communication Devices (PCDs) before and after school, during their lunch break, in between classes as long as they don't interfere with the education environment, and during after school activities and school related functions. Use of PCDs, except those approved by a teacher or administrator, at any other time is prohibited and the device must be put in slient/vibrate mode and stored out of sight. Elementary students may use their PCDs only with approval of a teacher or administrator for education or other approved purposes. Students may not use PCDs on school property or at a school-sponsored activity to access and/or view Internet web sites that are otherwise blocked to students at school. Students may use PCDs while riding to and from school or school

sponsored activities, on a school bus or other Board-approved vehicle or at the discretion of the bus driver, classroom teacher, or a sponsor/advisor/coach. Distracting behavior that creates an unsafe environment will not be tolerated. PCDs with cameras or any other recording capabilities, may not be activated or utilized at any time in any school situation where a reasonable expectation of personal privacy exists. These locations and circumstances include but are not limited to, classrooms, gymnasiums, locker rooms, shower facilities, rest/ bathroom, and any other areas when students or others may change clothes or be in a stage or degree of disrobing or changing clothes. The District Administrator and building principals are authorized to determine other specific locations and situations where use of a PCD is absolutely prohibited.

Students shall have no expectation of confidentiality with respect to their use of PCDs on school premise/property.

Possesion of a PCD by a student at school is a privilege that may be forfeited by any student who fails to abide by the terms of this policy, or otherwise abuses this provilege. (Board Policy 5136)

See the student handbook for additional details/consequences of student's unapproved use of PCDs.

Search of Student Possessions

Search of a student and his/her possessions, including vehicles, may be conducted at any time the student is under the jurisdiction of the Board Of Education, if there is a reasonable suspicion that the student is in violation of law or school rules. A search may also conducted to protect the safety of others or as otherwise permitted by law. Searches may involve the use of drug sniffing dogs. Students are provided lockers, desks, and other equipment to store materials. It should be clearly understood that this equipment is the property of the school and may be searched at times if there is reasonable suspicion that a student has violated the law or school rules. Locks are to prevent theft, not to prevent searches.

Anything that is found in the course of a search that my be evidence of school rules or the law may be taken and held or turned over to the police. The school reserves the right not to return items which have been confiscated. (Board Policy 5771)

Athletic Passes

Athletic Passes afford the owner admission to all School District of Horicon HOME athletic events, with the following exceptions: Passes are not valid for events that are a part of a WIAA tournament series, for all-day tournaments/events (wrestling invitationals, conference tournaments, etc.), or for events held at other schools. Passes are available in the school offices and at the admissions table to any home athletic event.

Adult Athletic Passes are \$28 for the year.

Senior Citizens age 55 or better may request a free pass.

Horicon Middle School and Horicon High School students (grades 6-12) are afforded FREE entry to sports events. It is suggested that these students bring their student ID, because admissions personnel may not recognize every student.

Admission for students in 5th grade or below is \$3 UNLESS THE STUDENT IS ACCOMPANIED BY AN ADULT. If they are accompanied by an adult, they are admitted FREE.

Ticket prices for a single athletic event are \$5 for adult and \$3 for students.

Education for Employment

The School District of Horicon provides opportunities education related to employment. Beginning in 6th grade, students participate in Academic and Career Planning time to develop career awareness, explore a variety of careers, and study the preparation required for areas of interest. Additionally, any student in grades 9 to 12 may enroll in the Early College Credit Program and any student in 11th or 12th grade may enroll in a course at a Wisconsin Technical College System campus through the Start College Now Program. Both these programs require School Board approval. Contact the High School Guidance Counselor for more information. (Board Policy 2420)
